The Crimes Compensation Trust Fund is authorized under s. 960.21, Florida Statutes. The funds purpose is to compensate victims of crime. Revenues come from additional court costs, received from fines, or received from any other public or private source.

Any reductions to this fund would likely result in a reduction in compensation amounts or fewer claims processed. Compensation includes medical/dental treatment, funeral/burial, mental health and other forms of direct assistance. The current spending authority for compensation to victims is \$24.8 million.

Many innocent persons suffer personal injury or death as a direct result of adult and juvenile criminal acts or in their efforts to prevent crime or apprehend persons committing or attempting to commit adult and juvenile crimes. Such persons or their dependents may thereby suffer disabilities, incur financial hardships, or become dependent upon public assistance. The Legislature finds and determines that there is a need for government financial assistance for such victims of adult and juvenile crime. Accordingly, it is the intent of the Legislature that aid, care, and support be provided by the state, as a matter of moral responsibility, for such victims of adult and juvenile crime. It is the express intent of the Legislature that all state departments and agencies cooperate with the Department of Legal Affairs in carrying out the provisions of this chapter. (Section 960.02, F.S.)

Crime victims served by this program include victims of assault, battery, homicide, sexual offenses, domestic violence, driving while intoxicated, hit and run, stalking, robbery, terrorism, kidnapping, arson, and all other violent crimes. Eligible expenses paid by the victim compensation program include medical/dental, mental health treatment, crime scene cleanup, funeral/burial, wage loss, loss of support, disability, forensic sexual assault examinations, property loss (for elderly and disabled adults only), and relocation expenses (only for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault).

Priority #2

The programs described below provide community based services in selected communities. Any reduction to these valuable programs would result in fewer at-risk youth and crime victims served.

Adults Mankind Organization, Inc. (\$517,440)

The Adults Mankind Organization, Inc. is funded at \$950,000 recurring General Revenue and is a minority crime prevention program that serves at-risk youth. The program targets low-income neighborhoods and provides comprehensive life skills/employability and on-the-job training, and job placement. Many of these youth served are at risk for entering the juvenile justice system, have been diverted for non-judicial handling, and have poor grades and attendance in school.

Reductions to this program impacts the number of youth served. Elimination of the program impacts more than 190 at-risk

youth that would not be placed in employment and another 220 at-risk youth who won't receive work experience. This program has been funded since 2004-05.

Community Coalition Inc. (\$517,440)

The Community Coalition Inc. is funded for \$950,000 recurring General Revenue. Community Coalition is also a Minority Crime Prevention Program that is designed to assist at risk youths with tutoring, employability skills and on-the-job training, and direct job placement. They also assist by offering study courses for individuals who have not attained their high school diploma. This program provides services to target the needs of youth who are involved in the juvenile justice system or are at risk of becoming involved due to various high risk criteria. The focus of the program is to reduce juvenile crime by training the youth for the world of work. The program provides a pre-vocational assessment in order to determine the level of need of each participant, and then helps the youth focus on their futures through counseling and training in employment skills. This program services the Miami area.

Reductions to this program impacts the number of youth served (job readiness). Measured by a pre-test and post-test, this training has shown that at least 70 percent of the participants improve their employability skills. The training also results in 70 percent of the participants remaining crime-free while in the program and 80 percent remaining in school while in the program. Failure to fund this program will result in 90 at-risk or minority youths not being placed in paid apprenticeships in the private industry and 176 participants not completing 100 hours of work. It will also result in 220 at-risk or minority youths not being placed in a paid work experience program. The Community Coalition Inc. has been funded since 2004-05.

The Urban League Consortium (\$1,731,653)

The Urban League Consortium is funded for \$3,179,247 recurring General Revenue. These are nonprofit social service organizations that assist African Americans and others who are in need to achieve social and economic equality. The consortium implements crime prevention programs in the Black community and coordinates these activities with local law enforcement agencies. They also implement a statewide crime prevention and intervention program which is targeted at young crime victims and their families, first offenders, at risk youth and school drop outs. The consortium consists of the following Urban League organizations: Tallahassee, Metro Orlando, Greater Miami, Tampa-Hillsborough, Jacksonville, Broward County, Palm Beach County and West Palm Beach.

Failure to fund this program will result in almost 2,000 youths not receiving direct contact in areas such as personal and community empowerment, academic tutoring, employability skills, behavior modification, social responsibility and character building, and gang resistance. At least 80 parents of at-risk adolescents will also not receive training on how to raise their children free of non-productive behaviors leading to drug and alcohol abuse and other delinquent issues. Failure to fund will also result in the loss of 80 workshops that bring together a diverse group of advocates charged with implementation of youth crime prevention strategies.

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The Urban League Consortium has been funded at some level within the budget of the Attorney General for at least 25 years.

Florida Council Against Sexual Violence (272,337)

The Florida Council Against Sexual Violence is a statewide nonprofit organization committed to victims and survivors of sexual violence and the sexual assault crisis programs who serve them. The Council is funded with \$500,000 recurring General Revenue.

Quigley House (108,935)

Quigley House is a comprehensive Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Center serving the Clay County Area in Northeast Florida. The Quigley House is funded with \$200,000 recurring General Revenue.

Child Safety Matters (904,159)

MBF Child Safety Matters is a comprehensive, developmentally appropriate, effective prevention program. This practical and affordable program helps protect students from bullying, cyberbullying, digital abuse, and all types of child abuse. Child Safety Matters is funded with \$1,660,000 recurring General Revenue.

Florida Sheriff's Association (435,739)

Funds distributed to the Florida Sheriff's Association for the purpose of enhancing Crisis Intervention Team's training for law enforcement and correctional officers in local sheriff's offices and police departments. This issue is funded with \$800,000 recurring General Revenue.

Bridging Freedom (381,272)

Bridging Freedom's mission is to combat minor sex-trafficking by bringing restoration to those rescued and victim prevention to those we reach with our message. We educate the community and work with partnering organizations to increase awareness about this horrendous issue. Bridging Freedom is funded with \$700,000 recurring General Revenue.

Justice Coalition (163,402)

Justice Coalition is a grassroots 501 (c) 3 nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that advocates on behalf of innocent victims of crime in a five-county area of Northeast Florida. Victims have rights and Justice Coalition ensures they know those rights. It also provides support and encouragement from the time a crime is committed until the case is closed. Justice Coalition has helped thousands of crime victims by providing services specific to their immediate needs, including collaborating with the State Attorney's Office, other nonprofits, businesses and volunteers to ensure victims

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are served. The Justice Coalition is funded with \$300,000 recurring General Revenue.
