2012-2013 BUDGET YEAR NARRATIVE: FL BOATING IMPROVEMENT PRG IT COMPONENT? NO

Request:

This issue requests \$592,600 in spending authority from the Marine Resources Conservation Trust Fund (MRCTF) and \$1,250,000 from the State Game Trust Fund (SGTF) to continue a long term program of providing grants to local governments for boating improvements.

Current Situation:

Pursuant to Section 328.72(15), Florida Statutes, an estimated \$592,600 will be deposited into the MRCTF from \$1 directed from the county portion of vessel registration fees to be used to fund a competitive grant program for local projects providing public launching facilities.

As directed by section 206.606(1)(b), Florida Statutes, \$1,250,000 is transferred annually from the Fuel Tax Collection Trust Fund to the SGTF to fund local projects through a competitive grant program for recreational channel marking, public launching facilities, derelict vessel removal, and other local boating related activities. These funds are used to provide grants to local governments.

2012-2013 BUDGET YEAR NARRATIVE: BOATING INFRASTRUCTURE IT COMPONENT? NO

Request:

This issue requests \$3,200,000 in spending authority from the Federal Grants Trust Fund. Included in this request is \$1,200,000 from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) through the Sport Fish Restoration Act - Boat Access, which have been apportioned to Florida for boating infrastructure. If the apportioned funds are not spent, the unobligated funds will be reallocated to other states and future apportionments will be reduced to the State of Florida.

This request also includes funding for one grant that will be submitted to USFWS, Boating Infrastructure Grant Program (BIGP), for a Tier II project for \$1,900,000 and Tier I projects for \$100,000. Most projects take more than one year to complete due to permit requirements, environmental issues, and other delays, therefore fixed capital outlay funding will allow for these projects to be completed without a delay in appropriations.

Current Situation:

The Commission receives federal funds from the U.S. Department of Interior, USFWS, Sport Fish Restoration Act. Funds are apportioned each year to the State of Florida pursuant to the Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act that provides funding for boating access facilities, both marine and freshwater.

The Commission is Florida's State Administrative Agency (SAA) for BIGP, which is a federal flow-through grant program to provide boating infrastructure for transient vessels 26' or larger with transient defined as 10 days stay or less. BIGP

2012-2013 BUDGET YEAR NARRATIVE: TENOROC SHOOTING RANGE FAC IT COMPONENT? NO

Request:

This request is for spending authority from the Federal Grants Trust Fund, in the amount of \$300,000, for planning, developing, and building combined hunter-safety classroom, restrooms, and offices to serve the Tenoroc Fish Management Area and shooting range in Polk County. A training room located at this facility will assist the public in completing hunter-safety certification, and staff offices will allow current Commission hunter-safety staff to work on-site and provide better public service. The reception area will serve the guests visiting the shooting facility and the public fishing ponds. The funds requested will be from Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration grants and will constitute 75% of the funds needed for this project. The remaining 25% of the necessary funding (or in-kind support), which is required to match the federal funds, will be raised and provided by the Wildlife Foundation of Florida, Inc. (citizen-support organization for the Commission). The federal grant funds are allocated to projects in compliance with federal regulations governing state use of federal aid funds.

Current Situation:

The Commission's Tenoroc shooting range is one of the premier shooting sports facilities in the state. The range is used to certify more hunter-safety students than any other training facility. Students currently have to complete their required classroom training off-site and then travel to the shooting range. The hunter-safety classroom that was in the original design for this facility was never built. The current 20 year old modular building used for an office, storage, and restroom does not include a classroom as is in need of replacement. The site's Polk County location is ideal because this county hosts some of the highest densities of hunters and shooters in Florida.

Benefits:

This request will provide federal funding for increased public outdoor recreational opportunity and improved public service. As a result, more Floridians will be able to participate in hunting and other activities related to fish and wildlife. Specifically, a training room located at this facility will enable the Commission to conveniently assist the public in completing their hunter safety certification in one morning instead of having to make multiple trips to a classroom and then to the shooting range.

When the training room is not used for the hunter-safety program, it will be used to support other youth oriented outdoors activities as part of the Florida Youth Conservation Centers Network. The restrooms not only provide support for the Commission's training program, but also benefit the 16,000+ annual users of the public shooting range. Incorporating the hunter-safety regional offices at this site will allow Commission staff to support the operation of the facility and to immediately assist the needs of hunter-safety students and shooting sports customers.

Every year, more than 13,000 children and parents visit the Ocala Conservation Center, which has been providing outdoor experiences for Florida's families for more than 50 years. There are no public restrooms in the dining hall or in the dormitories, and there are no ADA-compliant restrooms at the facility. The dining hall seats 150 people and is used every weekend to host training events for Commission programs and events held by other organizations. During the week, this facility is used to introduce school children to the outdoors.

The dining hall is the most used facility on the grounds, yet this building has only one small restroom, which is for use by staff. The nearest public restroom facilities are more than 300 feet away and none of the restrooms on the grounds are ADA-compliant. The two dormitories that will receive ADA accessible restrooms accommodate 80 individuals for overnight stay during training events for Commission programs and stakeholder events. No ADA-compliant restrooms or shower stalls are currently available for any of the overnight accommodations. Individuals staying in these two dormitories currently have access to only a community shower and restrooms across the courtyard.

Benefits:

Approval of this issue will provide necessary restroom improvements in the dining hall and enable easy access for children to wash their hands before eating as well as provide restrooms within easy access of persons attending training sessions. Adding restrooms and shower facilities to the dormitories will bring them into compliance with State of Florida building codes Section 403 minimum plumbing facilities, as well as American Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance. Improved and ADA-compliant restroom facilities will increase the use and accessibility of this camp by children and adults, ultimately resulting in increased exposure to an appreciation for outdoor activities by Florida's children and families.

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AGENCY NARRATIVE:

2012-2013 BUDGET YEAR NARRATIVE: WMA LAND IMPROVEMENTS IT COMPONENT? NO

Request:

This request is for \$515,000 from the State Game Trust Fund to enhance land management operations within the Wildlife Management Area (WMA) system. The funding is received pursuant to section 259.032(11)(d), Florida Statutes, which requires revenue received through multiple-use management or compatible secondary-use management (leases, sales, and contracts) be returned to the lead agency responsible for such management and be used to pay for management activities on all conservation, preservation, and recreation lands under the agency's jurisdiction. This funding will be used for multi-year and multi-party improvements to lands within the WMA system, which will include land restoration and enhancement activities, as well as providing for enhanced public use and recreation.

Current Situation:

The Commission manages several revenue contracts (i.e. cattle grazing leases, timber sales, citrus, other agriculture and concessions) for land in the WMA system. Timber sales are the most lucrative contracts. The Commission has an agreement with the Florida Forest Service (FFS) to administer timber sale contracts. The FFS receives the revenues from loggers and transfers the timber sales revenues to the Commission, which is deposited into the State Game Trust Fund. There has been a delay in receiving revenues within the fiscal year the revenues were generated; therefore, this request is based on a back log of revenues received by the Commission.

Land management activities will include, but not limited to, prescribed burning, road maintenance, exotic vegetation control, and habitat improvement projects. Public recreation management activities will include, but not be limited to, road access and maintenance, trail development, wildlife viewing facilities (boardwalks, viewing blinds, and observation towers), hunt headquarters improvements, and interpretive signage/information. However, it should be noted that actual staffing and funding assignments might be subject to change due to unforeseen changes in management priorities or land acquisition patterns.

Request:

Section 259.105, Florida Statutes, requires that one and five-tenths percent of the proceeds of bonds deposited into the Florida Forever Trust Fund be provided to the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The Commission uses these funds to purchase strategic inholdings and additions to lands managed by the Commission, which help protect important fish and wildlife habitats and improve manageability. This year, the Department of Environmental Protection will ask for \$15 million in cash from its trust funds to serve in lieu of issuing bonds for this purpose. The Commission's share will be \$225,000.

Request:

Funds are requested for grants-in-aid to local governments, qualified nonprofit entities, and state universities for local artificial reef planning, development, assessment, and management pursuant to section 379.249, Florida Statutes and Chapter 68E-9, Florida Administrative Code.

Current Situation:

Program funding is received from two sources: Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration grants from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and saltwater recreational fishing license revenues, a portion of which serves as the match required to receive the federal funds. This program has a 25+ year history of working in partnership with local coastal governments, recreational fishing interests, and state universities.

Funds are allocated to projects in compliance with federal regulations governing state use of federal aid funds, state procurement regulations and appropriate division rules. Statewide artificial reef development and assessment is accomplished through contracts with local coastal governments, qualified 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations and state universities for local reef development and assessment.

There are three positions which have provided support to the Artificial Fishing Reef Construction and Assessment Program for over 15 years. They perform statewide reef compliance and performance monitoring of reefs as well as provide technical assistance to local coastal governments and other agencies on artificial reef construction issues.

Benefits:

Development of artificial reefs, either on new sites or to enhance existing sites, provides additional habitat area to benefit important recreational fishing stocks, increases recreational fishing and diving opportunities for state residents and visitors, and enhances coastal community economies. Assessment and monitoring of artificial reefs are essential to understanding the effectiveness of reef design, material, location, and use patterns in achieving the objectives for which the reefs were built. Assessment data will guide future reef development efforts. This capability more completely brings the Division into compliance with its charge to wisely manage and protect marine reef fish resources associated with artificial reefs while causing no harm to the marine environment.
